LGBITQA+ Travel Safety Information for RMIT Staff



Introduction

At RMIT, we aspire to be a place where people of diverse genders, sexes and sexualities are recognised, welcomed and free to bring their whole selves to work and study. The safety of our people is a top priority, both at our University campuses and while travelling for RMIT business.

While gender identity, sex and sexuality are protected attributes by Australian law, this is not always the case in countries around the world. Many countries do not legally recognise same-sex marriage and more than 70 countries consider consensual same-sex sexual relations a crime, sometimes carrying severe punishment.

While travelling abroad, local manners and behaviours may need to be considered when planning a trip.

Some things you might want to look into before choosing your travel destination:

- laws of the country
- attitudes and behaviours towards LGBTIQA+ individuals
- visibility of LGBTIQA+ identities
- if you are visiting an organisation, how they support their LGBTIQA+ community
