- Innovative literacy campaign model that has helped 10 million people in developing countries. Adapted for use in Australia.
- More than 40% of Aboriginal adults have low literacy. As high as 70% in remote areas.


Locations



Results

- Annually evaluated over 335 graduates so far.
- More than 4 x graduation rate of comparative programs.
- Over 50% of Literacy for Life graduates move on to work, further study or volunteer roles.
- Students improve one Australian Core Skills Framework level on one or more indicators within 6 months.
- 50+ Indigenous jobs created within Campaign so far locals teaching locals.

Results in the Northern Territory

- Over 130 students participated since 2019
- Employment and training for 20 local people, supported by ESL teachers
- Includes digital skills and setting up post-literacy pathways
- Flexible delivery to accommodate people already in employment
- More classes ready to go in 2023
