Demand for skills in sustainability grew worldwide, but global talent shortfalls signaled a challenge

As we explored ways to make our cities, lifestyles and economies greener, RMIT experts noted a growing need for trained professionals to monitor and analyse human impacts on natural resources, with a particular focus on sustainability, conservation and resource management.

Due to the restricted flow of global talent, however, one KPMG report noted that the future of the public service workforce may involve a shortage of skills in senior project management.¹



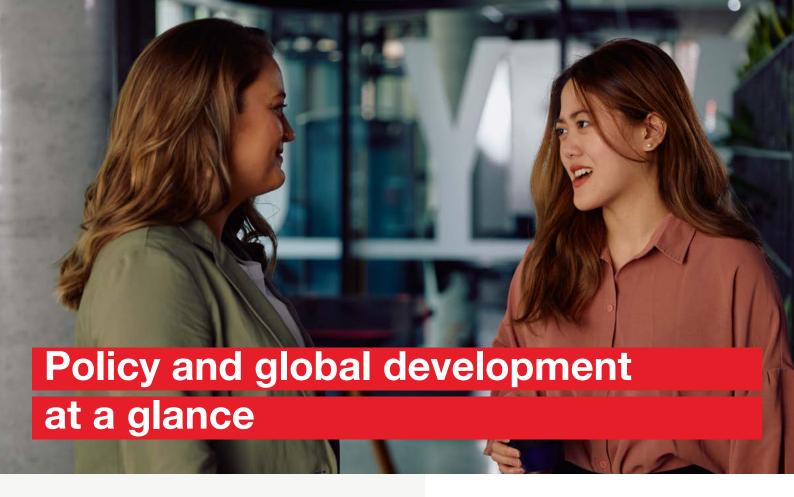
The role of our leaders is changing

Effective remote management, stakeholder coordination and increased collaboration across the Australian Government are just some of the trends that continued to rise in 2021, and are expected to grow for the future.

The Australian Public Service (APS) workforce strategy for the next five years states that purposeful leadership is key to achieving results, managing expectations and creating authorising environments that build on accountability and integrity.²

The APS strategy stated, "These authorising environments, alongside a culture of challenging hierarchies and encouraging and embracing new ideas generated across organisational structures, will foster innovation and contribute to our progress as an enterprise."
