RMIT's postgraduate options include graduate certificates, graduate diplomas and master's degrees. These options are designed to expand your knowledge and help you advance your career.


Get ready for the next opportunity with a vocational option

RMIT's vocational options (also known as TAFE) include certificates, diplomas, advanced diplomas and apprenticeships/traineeships. These courses provide a specific skillset and technical qualification. RMIT's vocational study areas range from accounting to carpentry.






Switch to a new industry



RMIT's postgraduate courses are the perfect solution. You've got a few options to choose from:

- **Graduate certificate** A great option if you need specific skills to enhance your existing credentials. This course can be completed in 6-12 months.
- **Graduate diploma** Gain transferable skills and experience your chosen field in as little as a year.
- **Master's degree** A master's gives you expertise in a particular discipline, as well as practical, industry-engaged experience. This option usually takes 2 years to complete.



Cost of living and job security is often on people's minds during uncertain times. Career and job market trends are the key to discovering opportunities that ease these worries. Here are a few examples from different industries:

- 80% of surveyed employers report that the biggest gap in their businesses is digital skills.¹
- The Australian and Victorian Governments are supporting the education of secondary teachers with new scholarships and post-study opportunities to meet a growing demand².
- Demand for business analysts in Australia is projected to increase by 23.2% over the next five years.³



Save time and money with recognition of prior learning (RPL)

RPL is where your previous work, life experiences and education are considered and may count as credit towards a qualification. This means you don't have to spend time learning things you already know, and you can save on course fees.

Another way your prior experience is considered is a credit transfer – where your previous formal study is assessed. If you can demonstrate you meet the learning outcomes for some of your RMIT courses, then you'll receive a transfer of credit from your previous study to your RMIT courses.
