Foreword

The 2025 Approved Schedule of Fees and Charges outlines all fees and charges that may be levied by RMIT University for enrolment or other engagement in the 2025 calendar year. RMIT University, including select controlled entities of RMIT University such as RMIT Online and RMIT University Pathways (UP), will henceforth be referred to collectively as 'RMIT'.

The fees and guidelines in this document are not applicable to enrolments or engagement with RMIT UP English language programs. Course fees for RMIT UP English language programs can be found at rmit.edu.au/study-with-us/levels-of-study/pre-university-study/english-language/english-language-pathways. Enrolment and refund policies for RMIT UP English language programs can be found at rmit.edu.au/up/about/policies-and-procedures.

The 2025 Approved Schedule of Fees and Charges is published under the authority of RMIT Council. All fees in this schedule and its appendices are subject to alteration by Council without prior notice. Approved changes will be recorded in the relevant fee schedule and published at rmit.edu.au/study-with-us/applying-to-rmit/local-student-applications/fees/approved-schedule-of-fees-and-charges.

Only fees or charges that have been approved in accordance with the Annual Fee Setting Procedure can be charged to students or persons. All student fees must be charged through RMIT's Student Administration Management System (SAMS) unless otherwise approved by Finance.

In broad terms, there are four categories of fees charged by RMIT:

Tuition fees for higher education, vocational education, preparatory and any other non-Australian Qualification Framework (AQF) enrolments. The tuition fees charged depend on a student's citizenship, program, and the type of funding place they have been offered.

Student services and amenities fees (SSAF) for services and amenities of a non-academic nature that enhance the student experience. These include sporting and recreational activities, employment and career advice, childcare, financial advice and food services.

Materials fees and charges associated with programs and courses offered by RMIT. These incidental fees include the costs of field trips, as well as goods that then become the physical property of students.

Administrative fees and charges. These incidental fees include fees for administrative services, graduation ceremony attendance, fines and penalties.

The following sections detail the fees and conditions that may apply to fees charged to students or persons, for enrolment or other engagement with RMIT during 2025.

1. Application of the 2025 Approved Schedule of Fees and Charges

All persons who enrol at RMIT for studies in the 2025 calendar year, or who otherwise engage with RMIT in 2025 (e.g. graduation, car parking, application for admission) are subject to the fees and charges detailed in this document.

All students who undertake their studies at RMIT in the 2025 calendar year are required to enrol. Completion of the enrolment process as outlined in the Enrolment Policy is a declaration binding a student to the rules and obligations of this schedule, including amendments approved by the Council or approved delegate. A student or person is liable for the financial obligation that results from their enrolment or other action pursuant to this schedule.

If a student has enrolled and wishes to cancel their enrolment, it is their responsibility to inform RMIT before the relevant census date. If they fail to do so their financial obligation remains and they will remain liable for all fees (such as tuition, SSAF and administrative fees), even where they are no longer attending classes. If a student has deferred their fees using a Commonwealth Government loan scheme, e.g. HECS-HELP, FEE-HELP or a VET Student Loan, they will be liable for that loan if they cancel their program after the relevant census date.

1.1. Creation of financial liability

Financial liability for all tuition and SSAF fees is created at the point of enrolment. Students become liable for material and administrative fees (excluding fines and penalties) upon signed agreement and/or upon receipt of the corresponding goods or service.

1.2. Cessation of financial liability

Financial liability only ceases upon payment or withdrawal from a course or program by the relevant deadline.

The only mechanisms to withdraw from a course are dropping individual courses via Enrolment Online, an approved Leave of absence submitted via Enrolment Online, or a verified request in writing.

The only mechanism to withdraw from a program is by cancelling program enrolment via Enrolment Online.

Note: a student cannot cancel their program enrolment via Enrolment Online if they are:

- an Open Universities Australia (OUA) student
- an international onshore student under the age of 18

To cancel their program enrolment:

- an Open Universities Australia (OUA) student must contact OUA to withdraw from program
- an international onshore student under the age of 18 must contact Student Connect to begin communication with the Senior Advisor, Youth Wellbeing Case Management.

1.3. Governing legislation

The 2025 Approved Schedule of Fees and Charges has been prepared based on the current Australian and Victorian legislation that govern RMIT operations.

RMIT reserves the right to amend the fees, charges, and guidelines detailed in this document in-line with any changes to this legislation implemented after the publication of this document. Should any inconsistencies arise between this document and the legislation, the legislation will prevail.

2. Tuition fees

2.1. Annual fees

Students will be charged a fee for each course (subject) they enrol in. This is based on a student's program code and enrolment term. Higher education and Foundation Studies students will be charged a fee per credit point. Preparatory and vocational education students will be charged a fee per nominal hour.

The Associate Degree in Aviation (Professional Pilots) or the Bachelor of Aviation (Pilot Training) may also have additional course list fees based upon the course(s) in which they are enrolled.

Program and course tuition fees for students who commence their program in 2025 are held constant for the 2025 calendar year only.

RMIT reserves the right to annually adjust program tuition fees. Changes to program tuition fees will be applied at the beginning of each calendar year. In 2025, and future years, the annual tuition price increase is capped at 7.5%.

This cap applies to:

- Domestic and international onshore full-fee higher education students (including students enrolled with RMIT Online)
- International onshore full-fee vocational education and preparatory students (including Foundation students)
- International offshore students who are enrolled with, and pay fees to, RMIT Australia

For higher education fees, tuition fees may be rounded up to the nearest \$10.00 per credit point increment. This means the actual fee increase may exceed 7.5%.

Similarly, for international onshore vocational education and preparatory students, the program annual fees may be rounded up to the nearest \$250.00, in which case the actual fee increase may exceed 7.5%.

Domestic vocational education fees are not subject to an annual cap and fee increases may exceed 7.5%.

The terms and conditions detailed in this document relate to 2025 commencing students, as well as re-enrolling students, and are subject to annual review. Students who commence their program in subsequent years will be subject to the terms and conditions prevailing at that time.

Any changes to terms and conditions will be communicated prior to their effective commencement date.

2.2. Cohort pricing

Where the tuition fees for a given higher education program exceed the annual price increase cap a student who is currently enrolled will be entitled to complete their program at their current fee rate (subject to annual indexation). Newly enrolling students will be charged at the new fee rate. Any change of program is treated as a new enrolment, unless grandfathering arrangements are required under the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*.

This means that the domestic and international average annual 2025 tuition fees listed in the Appendices may, therefore, include two or more price streams for a single program. Where this occurs, the 'program description' field will indicate the cohort by calendar year that corresponds to the annual fee price listed. A student is allocated to a cohort based on the semester and year they commenced their program.

2.3. International students on a non-student visa

Commencing international onshore students on a non-student visa will be charged the same fee rate for their program as student visa holders (Appendix 3). Continuing international onshore students on a non-student visa who commenced their program prior to 2022 were charged the domestic full-fee rate and will continue to be charged this rate until completion of that program and/or their visa status changes.

2.4. Standard or average load

Annual tuition fees listed are based upon standard load (total program load ÷ standard program duration) and normal progression, with pro-rata fees applying to non-standard loads.

Higher education tuition fees are charged at a rate per credit point. The standard measure of a full-time student load is 96 credit points per year for higher education programs. Some programs, such as double degrees, may require the student to enrol in more than 96 credit points in which case fees will be charged accordingly.

Please note, the above definition is applied to RMIT Australia. Students are enrolled at RMIT Vietnam in a full-time student load of 108 credit points per year for higher education programs.

Vocational education programs do not conform to a standard load per year, and the annual fees listed for these programs are based on a calculation of total program fees (at current year prices) divided by the total scheduled hours in a program. A full-time study load is calculated by the nominal total hours for the program divided by the full-time duration of the program.

Due to their variable program structure, some vocational education programs may have different fees that depend on a student's chosen stream or specialisation.

To illustrate, a program requiring 1,500 nominal hours over two (2) years may require students to undertake 700 nominal hours in the first year and the balance of 800 nominal hours in the second year.

Assuming full-time enrolment, the student will be charged for 700 nominal hours in the first year at the rate per nominal hour for that year, and for 800 nominal hours in the second year at the new calendar year rate.

Vocational education fees may be more than the total program tuition fee (including annual indexation) if a student chooses non-standard electives or if a student enrolls in subjects additional to the standard program load.

2.5. Higher education – Commonwealth supported places (CSPs)

A CSP is an arrangement where the tuition fee is jointly paid by the student and the Commonwealth Government. The student's share of the fee (student contribution) is set by the government and determined by the discipline areas (bands) of their individual enrolled courses (subjects), not the overall program.

A student is a CSP student only if they have received confirmation from RMIT that they have been offered a CSP, and the student accepts that place and their eligibility has been verified.

CSP students are subject to the Student Learning Entitlement which limits most students to seven years of full-time study in a CSP place.

Some CSP students, may be eligible for a HELP loan which will allow them to defer payment of up to 100% of their student contribution (see section 2.6) unless they exceed their HELP loan limit.

It is a condition of enrolment in a CSP that students pay their student contribution amount or, if eligible, successfully apply for a HECS-HELP loan and provide their verified USI and verified Tax File Number, by the census date.

If a CSP student does not have an approved HECS-HELP loan by the census date, they must make full upfront payment of their student contribution amount by the census date, or their enrolment must be cancelled in accordance with the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*.

There is no extension available for the payment due date of student contribution amounts and the census date is the deadline for making all upfront payments as required by the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*.

There is no appeal for CSP enrolment cancellation due to non-payment of fees. If a student can demonstrate payment was made on or before the census date, but it did not clear their student financial account, they should contact Student Connect as soon as possible to initiate a trace on their payment.

Students cancelled from a CSP for non-payment will be allowed to enrol in their program in the next semester.

Students in a CSP who are repeatedly cancelled for non-payment may be prevented from re-enrolment and directed to reapply for a place in their program.

Students who enrol in courses additional to the minimum requirements to complete their CSP are not entitled to access Commonwealth funding for those courses and may be directed to drop the enrolment before the census date or be charged the domestic full-fee rate.

2.5.1. CSP grandfathering arrangements

The Commonwealth Government introduced changes to the way tertiary education is funded from 2021 under the Job-Ready Graduates Package.

Continuing Commonwealth supported place students who commenced prior to 2021 will have their student contribution amount grandfathered under the pre-2021 rate (subject to annual indexation).

If continuing students from prior to 2021 are enrolled in units that resulted in their student contribution amount being lowered under the Job-Ready Graduates Package, then the student will be charged the lowered rate.

2.5.2. Calculating the student contribution

CSP students are charged a student contribution amount per course based on the HECS band that the course falls within. Additionally, the Effective Full-Time Student Load (EFTSL) weight of the course as a proportion of a full-time study load is considered. The weight of courses is measured as a proportion of a full-time student load (1 EFTSL) and can also be measured in credit points.

A standard annual full-time load for higher education students at RMIT is equivalent to 96 credit points. Some programs, such as double degrees, may require the student to enrol in more than 96 credit points and fees will be charged accordingly.

It is important to note that the HECS band that a course falls into is determined by the individual 'unit of study', not the program or degree. That is, if a student enrolls in a nursing course and an accounting course as part of a Bachelor of Nursing program, the nursing course will be charged at the appropriate HECS band for a nursing unit of study and the accounting course will be charged at the appropriate HECS band for an accounting unit of study.

If the student contribution amount for a course is an amount made up of dollars and cents, it will be rounded down to the nearest dollar (e.g. $\$4,627 \times 0.125 \text{ EFTSL} = \578.38 , which will be rounded to \$578).

Professional Pathway Psychology and Professional Pathway Social Work program fees

Commencing students in these programs will be charged student contribution fees based on their program type for the units (courses) that meet the Australian Government's Professional Pathway Psychology or Professional Pathway Social Work requirements.

For Professional Pathway Psychology, these are units that begin with field of education prefix 0907 (e.g. 090701, 090799).

For Professional Pathway Social Work, these are units that begin with field of education prefix 0905 (e.g 090509, 090513).

Postgraduate Clinical Psychology

Continuing and commencing students in **MC002 Master of Clinical Psychology** will be charged CSP fees at the Postgraduate Clinical Psychology rate for units (courses) that meet the government's requirements for this program type, which are units with field of education 090701.

2.5.4. 2025 CSP fees for continuing students

Grandfathering arrangements will be in place for continuing students who commenced prior to 2021 who would see an increase in their student contribution amounts under the government's Job Ready Graduate program.

Under these arrangements, students who commenced their course of study before 1 January 2021, and whose student contribution amounts increased for a unit, will instead have their student contribution amount remain as it was under 2020 arrangements (with fees indexed by CPI each year).

If continuing students are enrolled in units that saw their student contribution amount lowered under the Job Ready Graduates program, their student contribution will be the lowered amount.

2.5.5. Program places that do not qualify for Commonwealth support

A student cannot be enrolled in a Commonwealth supported place under the following circumstances:

- The course contributes to a program that is being undertaken primarily at an overseas campus
- The enrolment is an employer-reserved place
- The course forms part of a bridging course for overseas-trained professionals, or
- The course forms part of a program the Minister has specified, by way of legislative instrument, that students cannot be enrolled in as Commonwealth supported students

2.5.6. Courses that do not qualify for Commonwealth support

CSP students must enrol in courses within their program structure, not exceeding the minimum requirements to complete their award. Students who exceed minimum program requirements, or enrol in courses outside their program structure, are not entitled to access Commonwealth funding for those courses.

Students who study additional courses that do not directly contribute towards their award, or after they have already met the requirements of their award, must do so under non-award study or RMIT single course enrolment at the full fee rate.

If a student has already completed a course for which a pass grade or higher has been achieved, and the course contributes to the academic requirements of the award program, they are not entitled to re-enrol in that same course and be Commonwealth supported.

2.5.7. Open Universities Australia (OUA) courses

RMIT offers a select number of courses and programs through OUA. OUA courses studied at RMIT may lead to either a RMIT or partner university qualification, and the RMIT award is identical to those awarded to non-OUA students at RMIT.

Tuition fees are charged directly by OUA, except for continuing CSP students. As of January 2021, RMIT no longer offers Commonwealth supported places to commencing undergraduate students applying to study via OUA.

2.6. Higher Education Loan Program (HELP)

A HELP loan can assist eligible students to pay their student contribution amount, tuition fees, the student services and amenities fee, or to meet overseas travel expenses. HELP is administered under the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*.

The Study Assist website studyassist.gov.au contains a link to the [myHELPPbalance portal](#), which is designed to help students keep track of how much Commonwealth assistance they have used, and the balance they have left to borrow.

The government may make changes to the legislation for HELP at any time. Should any inconsistencies arise between this document and the Study Assist website or relevant legislation, the information contained on the Study Assist website or in relevant legislation will prevail.

2.6.1. VET Student Loans – vocational education students

Many RMIT vocational education programs are eligible for a capped loan under the Commonwealth Government's VET Student Loans (VETSL) scheme.

A VET Student Loan can be accessed to meet all, or some, of the costs of tuition incurred by:

- eligible full-fee vocational education students who enrol in a VETSL approved diploma, advanced diploma, vocational graduate certificate or vocational graduate diploma program
- eligible vocational education students in a Victorian Government subsidised place who enrol in a VETSL approved diploma or advanced diploma program

The list of RMIT programs that are eligible and ineligible for a VET Student Loan is available on the [HELP loans and VET Student Loans webpage](#).

For some eligible programs, the VET Student Loan program loan limit does not cover the full amount of the tuition fee.

Any amount a student borrows under a VET Student Loan for their program (including study undertaken in the same program with a different provider) will contribute towards their VET Student Loan program loan limit, as well as their combined HELP loan limit (see section 2.6.2).

VETSL program loan limits are set annually by the Commonwealth Government. Once a student has reached the loan limit for their program, they can no longer defer tuition fees for that program to their VET Student Loan.

Full fee students will incur a 20% loan fee. Victorian Government subsidised students will not incur a loan fee. The loan fee does not count towards the students combined HELP loan limit (see section 2.6.2).

2.6.1.1 Completing VETSL Progression and Engagement Forms

Students accessing a VET Student Loan will be required to complete Government-issued VET Student Loan Progression and Engagement Forms at key points each year throughout their study. Failure to complete two consecutive Progression and Engagement Forms will result in the Government deeming the student is non-genuine and therefore ineligible for a VET Student Loan and will result in the cancellation of the student's program enrolment.

2.6.2. Combined HELP loan limit

Eligible students can borrow up to the combined HELP loan limit to pay their tuition fees or student contribution amount.

For 2025, the HELP loan limit is \$126,839 for most students. The limit for students studying higher education programs in medicine, dentistry, veterinary science, and approved aviation programs will be \$182,172.

All students are responsible for keeping track of their available HELP loan balance, and where a student reaches their HELP loan limit, they must pay their fees directly to RMIT before the due date.

2.6.3. Renewable HELP balance

Students can top up their HELP balance by making repayments on their HELP debt. Voluntary repayments to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) will top up a student's HELP balance once processed by the ATO.

Any compulsory or voluntary repayments can be re-borrowed in the future, up to the current HELP loan limit. VET Student Loan program limits are still applicable and cannot be 'topped up' via repayments.

2.6.4. Provision of a Tax File Number (TFN)

If a student is applying for any kind of HELP loan or VET Student Loan for study at RMIT they will need to supply a successfully validated TFN for their loan to be approved.

If a student has not yet been issued a TFN, but has applied for one with the ATO, they may submit their *Certificate of application for a TFN* with their eCAF and must then submit their validated TFN on their eCAF within 21 days.

If their TFN is not submitted and successfully validated with the ATO on or before the census date, their loan will not be approved, and the student will need to pay their student contribution or tuition fees in full on or before the census date.

2.6.5. Eligibility for HELP loans and VET Student Loans

Eligibility requirements for HELP loans and VET Student Loans may vary throughout the year upon government advice and legislative change and are published on The Study Assist website studyassist.gov.au

2.6.6. Ineligibility for HELP loans and VET Student Loans

Students who are not eligible for HELP or VETSL must pay their student contribution amount or tuition fees in full to RMIT by the due date for each course.

If a CSP student who is not eligible for HECS-HELP fails to pay their student contribution amount in full by the census date, RMIT is required to cancel the student's enrolment, as per the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*

The student's program is cancelled for the applicable semester and the student may re-enrol in the next study period.

If a student makes a partial payment of their student contribution amount or has enrolments in other semesters with a different census date, only courses that have not been paid in full will be dropped from their enrolment for the relevant census date.

RMIT does not have any discretion with this matter and cannot accept a student contribution payment after the census date.

If a student in a full-fee place who is not eligible for FEE-HELP or a VET Student Loan does not pay their tuition fees by the due date, they will be considered a university debtor (see section 8).

If a student accessing a VET Student Loan student fails to meet the ongoing requirement of submitting their government issued Engagement and Progression forms, they will be considered non-genuine and ineligible for a VET Student Loan. Failure to submit two consecutive Engagement and Progression forms will result in cancellation of their program enrolment.

2.7. Higher education – domestic and international onshore full-fee paying

2.7.1 Program fees and charges

RMIT offers a number of undergraduate, postgraduate and research places to students who are not Commonwealth supported. The tuition fees for these programs are set on an annual basis and may be subject to change each calendar year.

Under the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*, domestic full-fee students in a unit of study (course) must be charged an amount equal to, or more than, what CSP students are charged for that unit. The only exception is where a student is enrolled in an employer reserved place.

The fees for all RMIT domestic full-fee programs have been set equal to or above the respective maximum student contribution amount. Appendix 1 provides a list of the average annual 2025 tuition fees for all domestic undergraduate and postgraduate full-fee programs (see Appendix 4 for tuition fees that apply to domestic postgraduate students enrolled via RMIT Online).

2.7.2 International onshore student fees

The Commonwealth does not contribute to educational costs for international students unless the students are in receipt of a Research Training Program International Tuition Fee Scholarship.

Furthermore, Commonwealth grant amounts provided to universities for the education of domestic students are not provided to subsidise places or services for international students.

The fees charged to international students must be greater than or equal to a minimum indicative fee specified by the Commonwealth Government.

All RMIT fees have been set above these minimum requirements. Appendix 3 of this document lists the 2025 average annual tuition fees for international onshore students

2.7.2.1 International onshore applicant deposits

International applicants are charged a deposit to secure their place. The deposit amount is established by Global Student Recruitment at the time of offer and is subject to change. Payment of the deposit is received in advance of being enrolled and acts as a credit against a student's initial tuition charges. Conditions for refund of the deposit are outlined in section 11 and detailed on the [Refunds for Commencing or newly enrolled international students webpage](#).

2.7.3 RMIT Online

RMIT Online offers several fully online short courses and degrees. See Appendix 4 for the list of 2025 undergraduate and postgraduate tuition fees. Learn more at online.rmit.edu.au.

2.7.4 Calculating higher education tuition fees for a program or course

The information in this section does not apply to Associate Degree of Aviation (Professional Pilots) and Bachelor of Aviation (Pilot Training) programs. See section 2.7.5.

A higher education student's annual tuition fees are based on the number of credit points they are enrolled in for their program and the fee per credit point for that program in the current year.

Example: In 2025, a domestic student is enrolled in an undergraduate degree, which has a standard full-time load of 96 credit points and a fee of \$400.00 per credit point.

To calculate the annual tuition fee for this program, the student needs to multiply the number of credit points they are taking by the fee per credit point as follows:

Credit points		2025 fee per credit point		2025 annual tuition fee
96	x	\$400.00	=	\$38,400.00

2.7.5 Aviation program course fees

Students undertaking Associate Degree in Aviation (Professional Pilots) or Bachelor of Aviation (Pilot Training) programs will be charged a specific fee for each course, with practical flying-oriented courses attracting higher fees.

For more information, see Appendix 5.

2.8. International offshore students

RMIT Australia does not set fees for most international students enrolled at a global partner institute – these are established by the relevant partner.

International offshore vocational education, undergraduate and postgraduate by coursework students who are enrolled at a RMIT Australia campus and studying outside Australia via distance education will be charged a fee equivalent to the RMIT Australia domestic full-fee rate for their program. This includes New Zealand citizens studying outside Australia.

RMIT Australia PhD and Masters by research fees for international offshore candidates studying with RMIT Australia offshore by distance education are available in Appendix 6 of this document.

Appendix 4 lists fees for international offshore students enrolled with RMIT Online.

2.9. Enrolment at RMIT International University Vietnam

Australian and New Zealand citizens who apply directly to RMIT International University Vietnam (RMIT Vietnam) and enrol with RMIT Vietnam are subject to the fees and charges detailed at rmit.edu.vn/study-at-rmit/tuition-fees and are not eligible to access Commonwealth assistance.

An RMIT Australia student participating in a cross-campus exchange will continue to be enrolled as an RMIT Australia student, paying any tuition fees or student contribution amounts as they would if their study was undertaken in Australia.

2.10. Vocational education – Victorian Government subsidised places (Skills First program)

2.10.1. Tuition fees for government subsidised places

For eligible students, vocational education is delivered with Victorian and Commonwealth Government funding.

Tuition fees for a Victorian Government subsidised place will vary according to each vocational education qualification or skillset and are determined on an annual basis by the Victorian State Government.

Appendix 2 provides a list of the average annual 2025 tuition fees, as well as the amount per nominal hour, for all vocational education programs for government subsidised students.

2.10.2. Free TAFE

2.10.2.1 Free TAFE for priority programs

Under the Free TAFE for Priority Courses initiative, eligible students who commence an eligible priority course/program and are granted a Free TAFE place will have the tuition fees for their whole program paid for by the Victorian Government. The number of Free TAFE places available is subject to change and the Victorian Government may cap the number of Free TAFE places available for a program at their discretion.

Students must first meet the eligibility criteria for a government subsidised place, which includes location, citizenship, and education history (see section 2.10.5).

Students can only access one Free TAFE non-pathway program at any provider. Students assessed as eligible for a Free TAFE place can elect to accept or decline the offer of a Free TAFE place for the program.

Students will still be required to pay for other fees, such as the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF), graduation fees and applicable Materials fees.

2.10.2.2 Free TAFE pathways

The Free TAFE Pathways initiative enables eligible students to access additional Free TAFE programs if those programs are within the same Free TAFE pathway industry sector.

An additional Free TAFE waiver is only available to students who have completed a course that is part of a Free TAFE pathway and seeking to commence another Free TAFE program within the same industry pathway, irrespective of whether the program they completed was government-subsidised or fee for service (full-fee).

This initiative only applies to Free TAFE programs specifically outlined in the Free TAFE Pathways initiative.

2.10.2.3 Free TAFE Short Courses

Free TAFE Short Courses is an initiative offered by the Victorian Government to waive the course fees for select skill sets for eligible students.

Further information about Free TAFE pathways and short courses is available at: vic.gov.au/free-tafe

2.10.3. Job Trainer Fund

As of 2023, the JobTrainer Fund has ceased accepting new commencing students. Continuing JobTrainer students will retain their tuition fee arrangements.

2.10.4. Program alignment with nationally endorsed training packages

Each vocational education qualification or skill set (excluding accredited 'Course In' skill sets) align to a nationally endorsed training package or nationally accredited course.

Training packages are reviewed and updated to reflect industry needs. Where a training package is superseded RMIT will, if required, develop a transition plan for any students enrolled in the qualification.

A variation to a qualification may result in an amendment to the nominal hours of a program. If this occurs, the program's nominal hours will be updated in the relevant fee schedule.

Students who are transitioned to a new program due to changes to their qualification may need to complete additional courses to meet the requirements of the new qualification. Correspondingly, the fees and VET Student Loan eligibility for the new training package / RMIT program may be different.

2.10.5. Eligibility criteria for Victorian Government subsidised places (GSP)

If a student is offered a Victorian Government subsidised place in vocational education, they must prove their eligibility* before they can enrol.

A student's eligibility for a government subsidised place will depend on their citizenship and education history including the number of programs they are studying in the current year. Students must be physically present in the state of Victoria or a border region that falls within specific NSW or SA postcodes including students studying via online delivery.

*Exemptions may apply to the Skills First eligibility criteria

The Victorian Government may at any time publish additional eligibility requirements or eligibility exemptions to be applied by Registered Training Organisations (RTOs).

Students will be enrolled according to how qualifications are defined in the relevant industry training package. This may impact on their eligibility for a government subsidised place for individual qualifications.

2.10.6. Eligibility criteria for individuals referred under initiatives or provisions

In 2025, individuals referred to training under the initiatives or provisions set out below may not be required to meet aspects of the Skills First eligibility criteria for a government subsidised place.

These initiatives and provisions are:

- Asylum Seeker VET Program
- Delivery of Training to Support the 10-Year Industry Plan for Family Violence Prevention and Response

2.10.6.1 Asylum Seeker VET (ASVET) Program

Asylum Seekers are exempt from the citizenship/permanent residency eligibility requirement for a Victorian Government subsidised place for the duration of their vocational education program, or until they withdraw from the program.

From 1 July 2023, eligibility to participate in the Asylum Seeker VET program is for individuals or dependants of individuals, who:

- hold any humanitarian, protection, or refugee visa in Australia, or
- have applied for a humanitarian, protection or refugee visa and hold a bridging visa for this purpose, or
- have made an application under s.417 or s.48b of the *Migration Act 1958* (Cth) which is yet to be determined and hold a bridging visa.

Individuals must have study rights and work rights are required for programs that include work placement.

RMIT is required to check an individual's eligibility for the Asylum Seeker VET Program by using the Commonwealth's Visa Entitlement Verification Online (VEVO) system to confirm the individual holds a valid visa.

2.10.6.2 Delivery of Training to Support the 10-Year Industry Plan for Family Violence Prevention and Response

This initiative aims to support workforce development to meet the industry plan for family violence prevention and response. The Course in Identifying and responding to family violence risk (National code 22510VIC) is a skill set offered under the initiative.

Students enrolled in this skill set are exempt from meeting the '2 Skill Sets in a year limit and/or '2 at a time' criteria. The Victorian Government will also waive the tuition fees.

2.10.7. Calculating vocational education tuition fees for a program or course

Vocational education fees for government subsidised places are calculated based on the nominal hours of enrolment.

To calculate a student's tuition fees, multiply the total nominal hours for the course or program by the fee per nominal hour for the relevant program listed in Appendix 2.

Example 1: Tuition fee per nominal hour for one program

A student is undertaking a Diploma and is enrolled in a total of 700 nominal hours in 2025. The tuition fee per nominal hour for the program in 2025 is \$10.00. Therefore, the 2025 tuition fee will be $700 \times \$10.00 = \$7,000.00$.

The fee charged for each semester in a calendar year may vary depending on the number of hours undertaken in each semester.

Example 2: Tuition fee per nominal hour for multiple programs

In 2025, a student is enrolled in a Certificate IV program with 200 nominal hours and a Diploma program with 300 nominal hours. The fee per nominal hour for the Certificate IV is \$5.00 in 2025 and the fee per nominal hour for the Diploma is \$8.00 in 2025.

Therefore, the tuition fee will be:

$200 \times \$5.00 = \$1,000.00$ (Certificate IV)

$300 \times \$8.00 = \$2,400.00$ (Diploma)

Total 2025 tuition fees: $\$1,000.00 + \$2,400.00 = \$3,400.00$

2.10.8. Tuition fee concessions and exemptions for students in government subsidised places

Some students in Victorian Government subsidised places may be entitled to an exemption or concession on their tuition fees.

Concession fees are not available for diploma and advanced diploma programs. However, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students will receive a fee waiver at all vocational education program levels in accordance with Section 2.10.9.1.

The concession fee rate is 20% of the hourly fee that RMIT would have charged a non-concession student in the same government subsidised program.

2.10.9. Eligibility for concessions and exemptions

A vocational education student enrolled in Certificate I – IV (Victorian Government subsidised place) at RMIT may be eligible to apply for an exemption or concession on tuition fees if they hold, or are a listed dependent on one of the following:

- Commonwealth Health Care Card
- Pensioner Concession Card, or
- are named on a Health Care or Pensioner Concession Card as a dependent child/spouse
- Veteran's Gold Card.

'Dependent child' has the same meaning as in the *Social Security Act 1991* of the Commonwealth.

If a student has applied for but not received their relevant concession card, they may instead provide a letter or temporary card issued by Services Australia that confirms they have applied for and been approved for one of the above listed concession cards.

They must then provide RMIT with one of the following before their census date:

- The physical original copy of their concession card;
- Their concession card displayed on a Digital Wallet through a Centrelink Express Plus mobile app on the cardholder's mobile device;
- The equivalent record of a concession card as extracted from Centrelink Confirmation eServices;

or

- Confirmation from a Gateway Service Provider that it has connected to the Commonwealth Government's Document Verification Service (DVS) and verified the student's details.

2.10.9.1 Vocational education tuition fee waiver for Indigenous students

Under the Skills First Aboriginal Access fee waiver, which replaced the Indigenous Completions Initiative concession as of January 1 2024, students who self-identify as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent at the point of enrolment in a vocational education program in a Victorian State Government subsidised place in 2025 are entitled to the tuition fee waiver amount at all vocational educational program levels.

2.10.9.2 Asylum Seeker VET (ASVET) Program

Asylum seekers are entitled to receive a tuition fee concession whether or not they hold one of the forms of fee concession entitlement specified in section 2.10.9.1.

Applicants enrolled in Skill Sets or programs at Certificate levels I-IV, who are eligible for a Victorian Government subsidised Skills First place will be eligible for a concessional tuition fee rate.

Asylum seekers undertaking programs at diploma and advanced diploma levels are not eligible for tuition concession rates.

2.10.9.3 When to apply for a concession fee or exemption

Students must apply for a tuition fee concession before their scheduled class start.

If the student applies after the scheduled class start date, then their concession or exemption will be applied to the next eligible class, as well as all other eligible classes that have not yet commenced, for the duration of their program.

If students have failed to apply for a concession prior to the class start date and the students' concession card is valid prior to the class start date, then there is a 60-day grace period for students to apply.

Students can apply for a fee concession before they have enrolled. They do not need to be enrolled in the program for the concession to be recorded. They only require an RMIT student number which they will receive upon admission to their program.

2.10.9.4 Judy Lazarus Transition Centre, community based order and Youth Access Initiative

RMIT must not charge a tuition fee for vocational education enrolment by a person who is:

- From the Judy Lazarus Transition Centre (as a prisoner within the meaning of the *Corrections Act 1986*). (A copy of written confirmation from the management of the Judy Lazarus Transition Centre must be retained.) Or,
- Required to undertake the program pursuant to a community-based order made under the *Children, Youth and Families Act 2005 (the CYF Act)*. (A copy of written confirmation from the relevant Youth Justice Unit of the Victorian Department of Justice and Community Safety must be retained) or,
- An individual referred with a validly endorsed referral form from either the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing, the Department of Justice and Community Safety, or a referring agency, which is defined for this purpose as an organisation based in the State of Victoria that currently receives funding or is contracted by the Victorian Government or the Commonwealth Government to provide services to children, youth and/or families.

Evidence listed above must be lodged at the point of enrolment.

2.10.9.5 University discretion

Authority to grant a university discretion tuition fee concession is delegated to the Academic Registrar, or nominee.

RMIT is permitted to grant a concession on a tuition fee where RMIT considers that its collection in full would impose extreme financial hardship.

This may include a further concession on, or exemption from, the standard concessional fee rate. University discretion concessional fees will result in lost Victorian Government funding for RMIT for the discretionary concession amount applied to the student record.

2.11. Vocational education fees for recognition of prior learning (RPL) and recognition of current competency (RCC)

2.11.1. Recognition of prior learning (RPL)

RPL is a process through which students can gain credit in recognised courses based on competencies gained. There may be fees attached to RPL assessments.

In 2025, vocational education RPL fees for government subsidised, domestic full-fee and international students are equivalent to the relevant standard tuition fees for the course(s) for which RPL is sought.

2.11.2. Recognition of current competency (RCC)

Recognition of current competency (RCC) is where a previously completed accredited qualification is assessed in circumstances where it may have expired or where the individual may not have been practising in their field.

Costs will be determined on a case-by-case basis, however, will not exceed the amounts listed in the approved schedule.

2.11.3. Vocational education domestic and international full-fee places

RMIT offers a number of places in vocational education programs on a full fee-paying basis. Students who are ineligible for a Victorian Government subsidised place, or who are repeating a government subsidised course they have previously passed, may enrol as a full fee-paying student.

The tuition fees, concessions and exemptions outlined in section 2.10.9 do not apply to full fee enrolments. Appendix 2 provides a list of the average annual 2025 domestic full fee tuition rates for vocational education programs.

2.11.4. Vocational education fees for international students

Appendix 3 of this document tabulates the average annual 2025 tuition fees applicable to students studying under a student visa arrangement (classified as 'international onshore' students).

2.12. Change in citizenship or residency status

International students studying in Australia who change their citizenship or residency status during their study, and become an Australian citizen or permanent resident, may be entitled to the be charged at the domestic full fee rate.

Depending on the established fees for individual programs, changing citizenship or residency status may not necessarily result in a reduction in fees.

If the student submits their change in status with accepted evidence to RMIT **before** the relevant census date, the student will be eligible for a refund of any difference between the international tuition fee and the relevant domestic fee. They will then be liable for the domestic fee for their program from the date their change in status is applied to their record.

If the student submits their change in status with accepted evidence to RMIT **after** the relevant census date, the student will not be entitled to a change in fees for the current study period. In these circumstances, for higher education students, the change will be applied to classes for which the census date has not yet passed. For vocational education students the change will be applied only when there is a period in which there is a break where all classes have ended, and the next classes have not yet started.

Students whose change of status means they may be eligible to access a HELP loan, or a VET Student Loan are responsible for ensuring they meet all relevant criteria and for submitting their electronic Commonwealth Assistance Form (eCAF) via the Commonwealth Government's online eCAF system by the relevant census date to access a loan (see section 2.6.5).

Where a student is required to submit a new eCAF or wishes to apply for an optional loan following a change in citizenship or residency status; RMIT must send the student's data to the government's eCAF system so an eCAF can be created. The student will receive an invitation to access the eCAF system via an email from the Commonwealth Government with 24 hours, to submit their eCAF in the online eCAF system.

RMIT is not able to facilitate back-dated loans after the census date under any circumstances. Due to these technology restrictions, RMIT requires students to submit notification of a change in their citizenship or residency status a minimum of 24 hours prior to the census date to ensure the change in status can be assessed and applied, and the student can complete the required steps in

the online eCAF system. Given this restriction RMIT cannot facilitate a change of citizenship or residency status on a census date.

3. Student services and amenities fee (SSAF)

The SSAF is used to maintain and enhance services and amenities, both on-campus and online, that improve the experiences of RMIT students.

The maximum annual fee is determined each year by the Commonwealth Government.

In 2025, higher education and Foundation Studies students will be charged on a semester basis at the rate of \$3.81 per credit point for each course they are enrolled in, up to a maximum of \$365.00 for the calendar year.

Vocational education students are charged on a Term (half yearly) basis, based on their enrolled study load, and charged up to the maximum of \$365.00 for the calendar year.

However, if a vocational education student is eligible for a concession on their tuition fees, they are also eligible for a concession on the SSAF. In 2025 the SSAF concession rate is \$0.10 per nominal student contact hour.

Due to the variable delivery of vocational education (for example multiple programs, cross-year session classes and full-year session classes), the ARG will manage student records to ensure no student is overcharged.

Eligible higher education students can apply to defer payment of this fee via the SA-HELP scheme (see section 2.6). More information www.rmit.edu.au/study-with-us/applying-to-rmit/local-student-applications/fees/commonwealth-assistance-help-loans

3.1 Students charged the SSAF in 2025

Students studying in any Higher Degree by Research or coursework program taught by RMIT Australia, and who are charged tuition fees by RMIT Australia, will be also charged the SSAF based on their enrolment in each Semester.

This includes students studying in the Free TAFE for Priority Courses initiative, OUA CSP students, and outbound exchange students (who remain enrolled at RMIT and pay all fees to RMIT but study at an overseas institution under a formal reciprocal arrangement).

3.2 Students exempt from SSAF in 2025

- Domestic students who commenced their Higher Degree by Research before 2021
- Students studying at an RMIT partner institution outside Australia
- Inbound exchange students coming to RMIT from another institution
- Cross institutional students, including:
 - inbound students studying at an RMIT campus in Melbourne
 - outbound students (i.e. RMIT students attending another institution in Australia)
- Study Abroad students, including:
 - inbound students studying at an RMIT campus in Melbourne

- o outbound students attending an overseas institution with which RMIT has no formal reciprocal agreement
- Industry sponsored students pursuant to the terms of their individual agreements
- Asylum seeker students who are enrolled in a vocational education government subsidised place

4. Materials fees

Materials fees include fees or charges associated with field trips, and goods that become the physical property of students.

Materials fees may only be levied with a student's signed consent. These fees are not compulsory (excluding fees for flight training courses) and students may choose to purchase these items independently.

The fees approved for 2025 have been reviewed to ensure consistency with the prevailing government guidelines. Appendix 7 provides a list of the Materials fees for 2025.

5. Administrative fees

RMIT Administrative fees cover specific additional services provided to students.

In addition, several fees have been approved that can be levied against a student's account as a fine or penalty when university regulations are broken, or borrowed goods are not returned. These fees are principally levied as a disincentive.

Appendix 8 details a full list of administrative fees and charges.

For some administrative fees and charges, information about how they will be levied is noted below.

5.1. Fines, fees and charges

5.1.1. Overdue Library materials and replacement charges

The Library will automatically renew loans 3 days prior to the item due date unless any of the following applies in which case the item will not be renewed and must be returned by its due date:

- a hold request is made for the loaned item;
- the loaned item has been borrowed for the maximum time permissible: 12 months, or 3 months for CAVAL borrowers;
- another loaned item is recalled or becomes overdue;
- the patron account has expired;
- the item is from the Reserve collection on a 4-hour loan.

Loaned items not returned by their due dates become overdue. The following applies to overdue Library materials:

Items less than 90 days overdue:

- borrowing rights will be suspended at all RMIT University Library sites,
- holds will not be able to be collected until overdue items are returned and the Library has cleared these from the student account.

Items 90 days or more overdue:

- items will be deemed lost and a standard replacement charge per item will be applied to the student account;
- replacement charges must be paid in full before the library will clear an account resulting in reinstatement of borrowing and holding rights;
- replacement charges will be waived where an overdue item is returned.

5.1.2. Car parking fees

RMIT provides students with casual and permit parking options at its City, Brunswick and Bundoora campuses. Free parking options are available for holders of disability parking permits at the Brunswick and Bundoora campus'.

Instructions on how to apply for a parking permit, and further information about disability permit parking regulations is detailed at www.rmit.edu.au/about/our-locations-and-facilities/facilities/parking-on-campus

Students are required to observe parking regulations on campus and are likely to be issued a Parking Infringement Notice (PIN) if they breach parking regulations.

Failure to pay a parking fine will result in the overdue fee being referred to debt collection (see 8.2.1).

5.2. Special administration services

Students enrolled at RMIT will receive administration services such as Statements of Enrolment and initial online tax invoicing without charge.

All RMIT students also receive one award transcript free of charge after conferral. The additional special services listed in this section may be provided on application.

5.2.1 Administrative fees applying to onshore international students

A non-refundable application fee (ADM14) is payable by international students who apply to undertake an RMIT program.

In addition, an international student may request an additional administration service of an airport pick up (ADM12) on their arrival in Melbourne.

These and other special administrative charges for international students are noted in the following table.

5.3 Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

All international students holding an Australian student visa are required to maintain valid OSHC with an approved OSHC provider.

Medibank Overseas Student Health Cover

All international students (and their dependents) require Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the duration of their student and student dependent visas. RMIT works with Medibank as the preferred OSHC provider, and arranges Comprehensive OSHC for international students

OSHC fees quoted on the offer letter are indicative and are subject to change on 01 May each year. Alternatively, student can choose to purchase OSHC themselves from an approved Australian health insurance provider.

OSHC adjustment for deferral of offer or acceptance

When a student defers their offer/acceptance, or changes preference or program, the OSHC duration is recalculated accordingly. The new OSHC fee is indicated on the new/revised offer letter. Once the student has accepted their new/revised offer, the updated OSHC fee is adjusted accordingly in their RMIT student account (SAMS).

Students will not require OSHC if they are:

- a Norwegian student covered by the Norwegian National Insurance Scheme
- a Swedish student covered by the National Board of Student Aid or by Kammarkollegiet
- a Belgian student covered under the Reciprocal Health Care Agreement with Australia

The Department of Home Affairs (DHA) has implemented mandatory Visa Length Cover as a requirement for all student visa applications. This means students must show the DHA that they have OSHC for the entire proposed duration of their student visa.

The proposed duration of a student visa will generally be granted by the DHA as follows:

Length of course	Length of stay
10 months or longer, finishing at the end of the Australian academic year (November to December)	The DHA will usually grant a visa stay period to 15 March of the following year
10 months or longer, finishing from January until October	The DHA will usually grant a visa stay period of 2 months longer than the course
Less than 10 months	The DHA will usually grant a visa stay period 1 month longer than the course

The maximum length of stay for a student visa will generally not exceed 5 years.

Masters by research and PhD students

The length of stay for postgraduate research students is generally 6 months longer than the timelines stated in the above table. This additional time allows these students to remain in Australia during the interactive marking of their thesis.

For example, postgraduate research students who are undertaking a course of more than 10 months duration finishing in November-December, we will generally grant a visa that ceases 15 September (an additional 6 months from 15 March) of the year following course completion.

6. RMIT childcare centre fees

RMIT provides a childcare service to students via the [City Campus Children's Centre](#). Failure to pay childcare service fees by the due date may result in the application of penalties, or the withholding of services as outlined in Section 8.

7. Bundoora on-campus accommodation

RMIT has student accommodation at its Bundoora campus offering great facilities and a community environment.

Pricing for UniLodge@RMIT Bundoora, also known as Walert House, is available at www.unilodge.com.au/student-accommodation-bundoora/rmit-bundoora/

A student who fails to pay accommodation fees is recommended to contact a Student Welfare Advisor via Student Connect to discuss their circumstances and financial options available.

Walert House accommodation scholarships are available to students from interstate and rural or regional areas who meet the eligibility criteria. Further information is available at www.rmit.edu.au/students/careers-opportunities/scholarships/coursework/unilodge

8. Debtors – overdue balance and penalties

RMIT students are required to pay their fees by the due date shown on their tax invoice, as agreed to in the Statement of Student Responsibilities.

Each charge has a due date and some dates may vary. It is a student's responsibility to keep track of their due dates.

Students can check the 'Summary of Charges by Due Date' section in the Account Statement of their Tax Invoice or log on to Enrolment Online to view their online financial account to view their fees and due dates (see section 9).

8.1. Debtor restrictions

Students will have debtor restrictions applied to their student record if they do not pay their fees by the due date. They may also have their enrolment cancelled (see section 8.2).

Debtors cannot enrol, add classes, obtain a transcript of results or a Statement of Academic Completion or related letters, view their academic history (results) via Enrolment Online or receive an award (graduate) until the debt is paid in full. Therefore, it is important for students to dispute a fee as soon as possible if they think they have been incorrectly charged.

8.1.1. Fee disputes

Students who wish to dispute a fee must contact Student Connect as soon as possible. Submission of any supporting documents must be sent from their RMIT student email account and should include their Student ID (example: s1234567) in all correspondence.

Once the student email is received, their disputed charge will be investigated.

If after the investigation the student is found liable for the fee(s) they will be required to make immediate payment.

8.2. Cancellation of enrolment due to non-payment

If a student has unpaid tuition fees of \$500.00 or more after the due date, RMIT is entitled to cancel their enrolment in all current programs, as per the [Enrolment Procedure – discontinuation of student program](#). Students who have their enrolment cancelled by RMIT due to non payment of fees will receive a full refund of a credit balance upon submission of the [Refund due to cancellation of enrolment form](#), pursuant to the applicable refund rules.

Students enrolled in a higher education Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) are excluded from cancellation due to the non-payment process and are managed in accordance with the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*, with the exception of students enrolled in a CSP program who are also a debtor in a fee-paying place.

Further information about cancellation of enrolment due to non-payment, and student financial liability is detailed in the [Enrolment Procedure – discontinuation of student program](#).

If a student's enrolment is cancelled due to debt, they:

- will be cancelled in all their current programs even if they have paid (or have an approved HELP loan) for the other program(s) they are enrolled in, including CSP programs
- must pay the tuition fees for any course they have already received a grade for or that has already finished and any materials or other fees e.g. library fines, and these fees will be referred to a debt collection agency
- must reapply to RMIT if they wish to continue their studies in the cancelled program(s)

8.2.1 Referral to debt collection

If a student has unpaid fees on their account after their enrolment is cancelled, or overdue non-tuition fees, they may be referred to an external debt collection agency.

Students who are referred to a debt collection agency will incur additional costs and their personal credit rating may be affected.

Once a debt has been referred to an external debt collection agency, all verbal and written communication will come from the agency. The student will continue to receive communication from RMIT for any charges that have not been referred to the agency.

8.2.2 Student visa implications

An international student holding a student visa subject to the *ESOS Act* who has their enrolment cancelled will be reported to the Department of Home Affairs (DHA) and have their Confirmation of Enrolment cancelled by RMIT.

As a result, the student's visa may be cancelled by DHA and the student may have to leave Australia.

8.2.3 Cancellation of enrolment review process

If a student has their enrolment cancelled by RMIT due to non-payment of their tuition fees, they may be permitted to be reinstated and re-enrolled if they are able to make full payment of all outstanding fees within prescribed timelines, as the [Enrolment Procedure – discontinuation of student program](#).

Reinstatement into a program cancelled due to non-payment is only permissible on one occasion, and an administration fee applies (ADM140).

8.3. Financial assistance

If a student is having trouble paying their fees, RMIT recommends the student considers the following options:

- reduce their fees by dropping classes from their enrolment before the census date
- apply for a leave of absence for a semester, or
- if they cannot afford their tuition fees, they may need to cancel their enrolment

It is the student's responsibility to seek advice, prior to changing their enrolment to avoid risk of breaching student visa conditions or HELP loans.

Students can also contact a Student Welfare Advisor to discuss what financial assistance may be available.

*Note International students on a student visa must be able to evidence a [compassionate compelling circumstance](#) when dropping classes or when applying for a leave of absence.

8.3.1. Fee extension

In exceptional circumstances that exist outside a student's control, and subject to the approval of the fee extension panel, a student may enter into a tuition fee payment extension arrangement with RMIT.

Students who seek a payment extension should contact Student Connect to have their eligibility assessed as soon as possible and no later than their invoice due date.

Payment extensions will only be permitted for tuition fees - all other charges must be paid in full by the due date as listed on the student tax invoice. Applications will then be assessed, and an outcome provided to the applicant.

Where a fee payment extension has been granted and the fees are not paid by the agreed date(s), the student's enrolment may be cancelled.

Students in a higher education Commonwealth Supported Place are ineligible for a fee payment extension, even if they do not meet the eligibility criteria for a Commonwealth loan scheme (see section 2.6.6).

Fee extensions will only be considered once for each standard semester. A student will not be granted a second fee extension in the same semester.

9. Payment of fees and charges

Prior to the start of the 2025 academic year, students who have enrolled will receive an invoice detailing their fees and charges for the following year.

Students will have debtor restrictions applied to their student record if they do not pay their fees by the due date(s). They may also have their enrolment cancelled (see section 8.2).

9.1. Tax Invoices

An up-to-date invoice will be issued to students whenever there is activity on their account, e.g. they make a payment, drop or add a course.

A PDF of their latest tax invoice will be uploaded to Enrolment Online and a copy sent to their RMIT student email account and their personal email account recorded with RMIT.

Students will have a notification email sent to their RMIT student email account and their personal email account recorded with RMIT when their tax invoice is available to view online. Students are required to regularly check and read all RMIT messages.

More information about tax invoices is available at rmit.edu.au/students/student-essentials/fees-and-payments/tax-invoices.

Students can also access their online RMIT financial account and view their latest and past invoices by logging into Enrolment Online and navigating to My Student Record.

9.2. Student payments

All student fee payments must be made in Australian Dollars (AUD) and paid via the approved payment methods detailed on the tax invoice issued by the university.

Students must make all required fees payments directly to the university. Students must not pay RMIT fees through an unauthorised third party, or via gift cards (pre-loaded credit cards).

Students can find approved payment options in their online account, on the *Paying your fees* webpage at rmit.edu.au/students/payment and on their tax invoice.

Students who have payment reversals (also known as charge backs) on their account may be subject to enrolment cancellation per the Enrolment Procedure - Discontinuation of student program.

Students should allow at least three to five business days prior to the due date for an electronic payment to be transferred to their RMIT account, dependant on the method of payment.

10. Discounts, fee waivers and scholarships

The *Higher Education Support Act 2003* requires universities charge tuition fees to full fee-paying students for any course or program, with the of domestic Research students who are enrolled in a Commonwealth Research Training Program (RTP) place.

Additionally, universities may award full-fee-paying students a scholarship to pay all or part of their tuition fees.

10.1. Scholarships

A wide range of scholarships are available to assist students while undertaking study at RMIT.

Many of these have been established to assist students in specific circumstances. More information about available scholarships is located <https://www.rmit.edu.au/students/careers-opportunities/scholarships>

10.2. Authorisation/approval of partial scholarships

Partial scholarships may be used at School or College discretion where they wish to ameliorate part of a students' fees. Please note, these are separate from the standard.

Applications for a partial scholarship are only permissible if the [Tuition fee partial scholarship](#) form is completed, approved and signed by the relevant authorised staff responsible for the funding of the scholarship.

Partial scholarships can be granted based on compassionate, marketing, staff and other grounds, or be used to correct university errors and support research efforts.

11. Refunds

The refund rules in this section apply to programs delivered by RMIT Australia and RMIT Online.

They do not apply to programs delivered by RMIT UP, RMIT UP English language Pathways, RMIT Vietnam or in partnership with other education providers.

For students enrolled with a global partner institution, the policy and processes of the partner institution on refund of fees and remission of debt apply.

11.1. Domestic and continuing international student refunds

11.1.1. Domestic student

A **domestic** student is a student who is:

- an Australian citizen, or
- a New Zealand citizen studying in Australia, or
- a holder of an Australian Permanent Residence visa, or
- a holder of an Australian Permanent Humanitarian Visa

Refer to section 11.6 Table A for applicable refund rules

11.1.2. Continuing international student

A **continuing international student** is:

- an international student (including a holder of a student visa, bridging visa or temporary visa) who has successfully studied in the first semester of their current program and their results have been officially released, or
- an international student who has been granted a Leave of Absence.

If an international student who has paid an acceptance deposit reduces their study load in the first semester of their program, they will not be eligible for a refund of the difference between the tuition fees they pre-paid for that semester and the tuition fees charged. Instead, the difference will appear as a credit in their student account and be automatically applied to future semester tuition fee charges. If the student reduces their study load in any semester other than their first, standard international refund rules will apply.

Refer to section 11.6 Table A for applicable refund rules

11.2. Commencing international student refunds

A **commencing international student** is a student who:

- holds a student visa or has been issued a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) to apply for a student visa. This includes cross-campus, exchange and study abroad students.
- holds a bridging visa* or temporary visa* and does not intend to apply for a student visa, AND (see below note*)
- is yet to enrol, or
- enrolls and cancels their enrolment in the first semester of their program.

Refer to section 11.7 Table B for applicable refund rules

*Note: Commencing international students who hold a bridging visa or a temporary visa and do not intend to apply for a student visa will have their refund applications assessed according to the refund rules for domestic students (see section 11.6).

11.3. International offshore student refunds

International students studying offshore, including New Zealand citizens studying outside Australia, who are charged tuition fees by RMIT Australia or RMIT Online will have their refunds assessed in-line with the rules that apply to domestic and continuing international students.

Refer to section 11.6 Table A for applicable refund rules

11.4. RMIT Online student refunds

Domestic and international (commencing and continuing) students enrolled in a degree with RMIT Online will have their refunds assessed based on the rules in 11.6 Table A.

Course deferral and withdrawal information for students enrolled in a short course with RMIT Online is available at online.rmit.edu.au/faq?

11.5. Applying for a refund

Credit balances within student accounts will not be remitted automatically.

Students must apply for a refund via the relevant process – see information and application forms below:

- [How to apply for a refund as a commencing international students](#)
- [How to apply for a refund as a domestic and continuing international students](#)
- How to apply for a refund for a refund due to cancellation for debt - [Refund due to cancellation of enrolment form](#)

Correct and complete applications for a refund will be processed within 20 business days.

11.5.1. Eligibility for a refund

A refund can only be paid when:

- the university has received the money that is to be refunded and the funds have been cleared to the student's account, and
- there is an available credit balance as the result of a payment, and the credit has not already been allocated to other outstanding student fees

All refunds of credit amounts on a student's account will be assessed against any outstanding fees or charges.

Overpayments will be assessed case-by-case and may not be refundable, unless the overpayment has been made for tuition fees in the last semester of study.

If an international student in their first semester of their current program cancels their current program before their result(s) have been officially released, their refund will be assessed and processed based on the guidelines applicable to commencing international students.

11.5.2. Ineligibility for a refund

A refund will not be available where a student:

- owes RMIT outstanding fees
- is seeking a refund for remaining school allocated print credits
- has cancelled or had their enrolment cancelled by the university, and
 - the grades have been entered, or
 - the course end date has passed, or
 - the student was in breach of enrolment conditions

Where a student's request for refund of fees is denied, the response will state the reasons for the decision and inform the student of their right to appeal.

11.5.3. Incomplete refund application

RMIT will allow 10 business days for additional documentation or information to be provided to support an application for a refund if required. The application will be closed if the required information is not received within this timeframe. A new refund submission will be required after this time.

11.5.4. Refund payment

RMIT will process refunds using the same payment method as the original payment.

Where the payment was made via a credit card, the funds will be returned to the same credit card used for the original payment.

Refunds that are processed via Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) will be paid into the student's nominated bank account. It may take up to 6 weeks for a refund payment to reach an overseas bank account.

RMIT reserves the right to request proof of payment. RMIT is not liable for any variance from foreign exchange rate fluctuations.

RMIT refuses to process a refund application when a discrepancy in the transferred amount and the issued invoice has been identified.

11.5.5. Refund of materials fees

Materials fee refunds for goods, excursions, and global intensives are at the discretion of the relevant teaching school.

Refunds for materials fees will not be processed until the school approves the removal of charges.

An administrative fee may also be charged for late withdrawal from an excursion or global intensive.

11.5.6. Refund of Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Commencing international student refunds:

- A student who has not commenced any program with RMIT or enrolled but never arrived in Australia is eligible for a refund of Medibank OSHC premium paid at their time of program acceptance.
- A student who has arrived in Australia including a student who arrived in Australia and decides to return home will be directed to the Medibank OSHC customer service team to apply for a refund of eligible OSHC fees.
- A student who did not arrange their OSHC via RMIT must contact their OSHC provider to apply for a refund of eligible OSHC fees.

Continuing International student refunds:

- Continuing international students must contact their OSHC provider to apply for a refund of eligible OSHC fees.

11.5.7. Application fees

Application fees are non-refundable. However, if an international student's application is successful the application fee will be credited to their tuition fees once they accept their offer and enrol.

11.5.8. SA-HELP

Students who withdraw on or before census date will not be liable for the SSAF previously applicable to their enrolment for that census date. If a student opted for SA-HELP, they will no longer be liable.

If a student has not opted for SA-HELP and they paid their SSAF up-front to RMIT, the student's account will be re-credited for the SSAF amount paid up-front and they can apply for this credit to be refunded.

Students who withdraw after the census date will remain liable for the applicable SSAF. If a student opted for SA-HELP, the SSAF deferred to SA-HELP is not refundable after the census date.

11.5.9. Remission and removal of debt in special circumstances

The [Remission and removal of debt procedure](#) outlines eligibility criteria for remission and removal of debt in special circumstances.

There are no provisions under the *Higher Education Support Act 2003* to have a debt remitted for a course if the student has successfully completed it.

There is no remission of debt in special circumstances for SA-HELP.

11.7. Table B: Refund assessment for commencing international students

1. Where a refund application contains untrue or inaccurate information the applicant may be asked to re-apply for the refund or the refund application may be denied
2. If the applicant is unable to provide any required documented evidence the applicant may only be eligible for a partial refund or the application may be denied.
3. If fraudulent documentation is found to be submitted as part of an application for refund or appeal against a refund decision, the student may be denied a refund.
4. A student who has enrolled and intends to withdraw from all study, must cancel enrolment before the census date to be eligible for a refund.
5. Students who enrol in a flexible term and cancel the enrolment after the flexible term census date will be charged 50% of the initial tuition fee deposit that was paid to accept the offer.
6. A student who defers their offer will have their previous acceptance deposit used to accept the new offer and the refund will be assessed against that transferred amount even if the new offer shows a \$0 deposit.
7. Application for refunds submitted after 12 months of program commencement will not be eligible for a refund. This includes students who accepted their offer and are yet to enrol in an RMIT program.
8. Correct and complete applications for a refund will be processed within 20 business days. The exception is a provider default (where RMIT is unable to provide the program) in which case the refund must be processed within 14 days.
9. The application for refund submission date will be recorded as the date of enrolment cancellation or the date of an application for release and used for refund calculations.
10. Students who accept a package of programs including an offer for an English for Academic Purposes may not be eligible for a refund of English fees. RMIT UP English language pathways will make the decision on a student's eligibility for a refund of English tuition fees. See RMIT UP [Refund Procedure](#) for more detail.

11. The same refund rules apply for deposits paid by students who are eligible for the international tuition fee bursary or Foundation Studies tuition fee bursary.
12. Where a student is administratively withdrawn from the university due to non-commencement on the agreed commencement date, the commencing international student refund rules apply.

11.8. International student appeals against a refund decision

A student may appeal a refund decision where they can provide new supporting documents for a refund application or demonstrate that RMIT has not followed its own instructions in assessing a refund. An appeal must be submitted within 20 business days of the refund decision notification.

If an appeal is unsuccessful, students will be notified. The notification will set out the reasons why the appeal has been denied and will include the Victorian Ombudsman contact details.

12. Tuition Protection Service

RMIT is bound by the Australian Government's [Tuition Protection Service](#) (TPS) framework and maintains a statutory obligation to report any provider or student default to the TPS Director and to the TPS Secretary.

12.1. Provider default

A provider default occurs when:

- RMIT does not begin a course at the location on the agreed starting day or the course is discontinued at the location after commencing and the enrolled student has not withdrawn from the course before the default day.

In the instance of provider default, tuition protection obligations must be met within 14 days of default.

12.2. Student default

A student default occurs when:

- the course starts at the location on the agreed starting day, but the student does not start the course on that day (and has not previously withdrawn), or
- the student withdraws from the course at the location (either before or after the agreed starting day), or
- the registered provider of the course refuses to provide, or continue providing, the course to the student at the location because of one or more of the following:
 - the student failed to pay an amount payable to the provider for the course
 - the student breached a condition of his/her student visa
 - misbehaviour by the student

In the instance of a student default, RMIT must complete payment of a refund within 4 weeks of a complete refund request submission date.

13. Financial liability

1. Students incur financial liability when they enrol in a program or course and remain enrolled after the applicable census date, except in circumstances that satisfy the criteria for [Remission or Removal of Debt in Special Circumstances](#), and where the student submits a valid application within the application period that is subsequently approved.
2. A student who formally withdraws from a course or cancels their program enrolment on or before the applicable census date will not be financially liable for their tuition fees or student contribution amount.
3. A student who does not attend or ceases to attend classes but does not withdrawal from a course or cancel their program enrolment before the applicable census date will retain financial liability.
4. Where a student is administratively withdrawn from the university due to non-commencement on the agreed commencement date, the commencing international refund rules apply.
5. Failure to formally withdraw or cancel enrolment before the deadline will result in the tuition liability remaining and the appropriate cancellation of enrolment and/or debt recovery actions will be enforced.
6. No changes to enrolment will be made after the census date unless there is evidence of a university error.
7. Cancellation of program enrolment by the census date does not exempt commencing international students from financial penalties such as administration fees and withdrawal penalties specified in the refund rules.
8. Students will remain liable for any outstanding Administrative fees and Materials fees, following course withdrawal and/or program cancellation.

Appendix 2 – Domestic vocational education government subsidised & full-fee program fees

1. Nominal hours may vary depending on electives chosen by student.
2. The student tuition fees as published are subject to change given individual circumstances at enrolment. These are tuition fees only, and do not include the SSAF or any materials fees that may apply.
3. Students may be entitled to a concession on their tuition and student services and amenities fees if they are in a Victorian Government subsidised place and meet the eligibility criteria to apply for a concession. If their application for a fee concession is successful, they will be charged a concession rate equivalent to 20% of the tuition fee payable by non-concession students in a government subsidised place for their program. Diploma and advanced diploma students are not eligible for a concession or exemption of tuition fees. Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander students in a government subsidised place are eligible to access a fee waiver on tuition fees at all program levels (including diploma, advanced diploma, vocational graduate certificate and vocational graduate diploma programs).
4. Programs eligible for the Victorian Government's 'Free TAFE for Priority Courses' scheme have this denoted against their program code in the fee schedule. Eligible students in an eligible program will have their tuition fees waived for their whole program.
5. RPL fees are equivalent to the standard tuition fees for the course/s for which RPL is sought.
